










#### A MESSAGE FROM NYASHA DERERA

As you are aware, Inclusion Revolution is the core of Special Olympics strategy: A Unified world in which persons with or without intellectual disabilities are respected, included and welcomed. In this regard, the Regional Youth Leadership Summit specifically engaged and empowered Youth to ensure active Youth Engagement as well as the sustainability of inclusive communities globally. The Summit gave particular attention to the Special Olympics 2016-2020 Global Youth Plan, which included a strong emphasis on Unified Schools. Participants were provided with tools, knowledge and resources to execute the Global Youth Plan and Unified Schools within their respective countries.

Since the Special Olympics inaugural event on July 20 1968, and following many years of advocacy and action for social change, the organization has grown to include more than 5 million Special Olympics athletes across 172 countries, with 80 percent participating outside the United States. Despite the success and joy of Special Olympics sports, people with intellectual disabilities still face gross neglect, stigma, and marginalization.

During the three-day Youth Summit, Youth Leaders collectively brainstormed, shared and planned on amplifying Youth Engagement in our Movement and building strategies to enhance the Unified Schools outreach. # **OVERVIEW**



#### Regional Youth Leadership Summit

The **2019 Special Olympics Africa Regional Youth Leadership Summit** brought together youth with and without intellectual disabilities from 12 Special Olympics Programs across the Region to launch the next 50 years of the Special Olympics movement and drive initiatives for respect and inclusion in their home countries. Accompanying the youth were 12 Special Olympics National Directors and 12 adult mentors. The 12 Programs in attendance included: Burkina Faso, Cote d'Ivoire, The Gambia, Ghana, Kenya, Mauritius, Nigeria, Rwanda, Senegal, South Africa, Tanzania and Zimbabwe.

During the three-day Summit, Youth were equipped with the skills needed to return to their Programs and create inclusive communities through the power of youth engagement. Participants were offered a platform for brainstorming, sharing and planning youth involvement in Special Olympics. The Youth Summit also addressed critical issues such as building strategies for enhancing Unified Schools outreach and impact, project management and partnerships, and keeping the vision of inclusion alive. While in Nairobi, Youth Leaders met with their National Director and adult mentor to work on a project plan that they would implement into their school/community upon return from the Youth Summits. Representatives of business, government, service organizations, civic society and international development also played important roles at the Summit.

Special Olympics and Lane Global Youth Leadership teamed up for a groundbreaking collaboration to empower Youth Leaders with and without intellectual disabilities through the Lead to Include Project, with added support by Kantar, Microsoft, and Lions Club International Foundation. This project is bringing forth a new opportunity for Youth Leaders to develop plans to implement an inclusive vision of Special Olympics in their home communities. The Special Olympics Africa Regional Youth Leadership Summit and Lead to Include Project would not have been possible without our partners.

# **DAY 1 OVERVIEW**

#### 2 October 2019



The Special Olympics Africa Regional Youth Leadership Summit started with an Opening Ceremony welcoming the Youth Summit participants, Leos of Kenya, representatives of Kantar, and honored guests. Some of the honored guests who attended include:

During his keynote, Siddharth Chatterjee touched on the importance of young people as the "future of tomorrow," which set the tone for Youth Leaders and their engagement in the Youth Summit. Following the welcome, UNICEF led a panel discussion, Children and Young People: Inclusion for All. The focus of the discussion was building strategies for ensuring inclusive mindsets and ignited thoughtful discussion among all participants.

Special Olympics International staff provided an overview of Special Olympics Unified Schools and Youth Leadership at work globally and in the Africa Region. This enabled participants to gain a better understanding of their work and its impact globally and locally.

A panel discussion in the afternoon, **Creating Inclusive Communities: Athlete and Youth Leader Perspectives**,
offered participants insight on the power of youth
leadership can challenge the status quo and bring about
positive social change.

At the end of the first day of the, participants at the Youth Summit celebrated what they learned at a traditional African themed dinner and bonded over the common theme of inclusion.









# **DAY 2 OVERVIEW**

#### 3 October 2019

SPECIAL OLYMPICS
LEAD TO INCLUDE

After a day of learning and sharing, the second day of the Special Olympics Africa Youth Summit opened with an energizing reflection that focused on the content presented in sessions and activities from the day before. The activity ignited discussion between Youth Leaders, adult mentors, and National Directors and kicked-off a day of collaboration.

After the morning reflection, National Directors moved into a separate session, where they focused on youth fundraising strategies, Regional best practices, and the importance of branding and marketing youth-work at the Program-level.

The plenary session, Activism: Sports as a Catalyst for Positive Social Transformation, provided an understanding of how athletics can be used to lead the future of inclusion. Unified pairs were given the opportunity to share how sports impacted their lives, which led to an overflowing amount of thoughtful stories and experiences from each Program.

The **Project Management and Presentation** session enabled participants to develop the requisite skills for maximizing project plans. At this session, Youth Leaders learned they would received \$1,000 - \$2,000 USD to lead a project that promotes inclusion in their school or community.

The afternoon comprised of a **Unified Sports Experience at Oshwal Academy**. This activity provided participants with an understanding of Unified Schools outreach in Kenya, and an opportunity to see what type of event Youth Leaders could lead in their school or community. Participants engaged in a Unified Floorball exhibition with the Oshwal Academy Unified Floorball team. Other activities at the event included a Zumba session and a Spread the Word: Inclusion pledge station.

To keep the spirit of friendly competition alive, participants joined teams for a Unified Bowling event and learned more about others within their Region.









# **DAY 3 OVERVIEW**

#### 4 October 2019



As the Youth Summit came to a close, participants had time before the final sessions to think and reflect on what they learned throughout the first two days of the event. As a delegation, each member discussed what they hoped to implement in their Program upon return from Kenya.

The morning reflection was followed by a panel discussion, Accessing Grants - A Partner's Perspective, where partner organizations shared information about grant management and best practices for Youth Leaders and their adult mentors. This session provided information about the expectations of partners, as well as resources for Youth Leaders when working on their Youth Innovation Project.

After learning about the importance of partnerships to leverage the impact of a Youth Innovation Project, Youth Leaders led conversations within their delegation about their project plan and prepared a two-minute "project pitch" to share with other participants. As Programs shared their plans, Special Olympics International staff members and Nyasha Derera, Sargent Shriver Global Messenger and member of the Special Olympics Zimbabwe Board of Directors, served as an advisory panel and provided feedback to Programs as they finalized their action plans.

At the conclusion of the Special Olympics Africa Regional Youth Leadership Summit, all participants were invited to the stage to receive a certificate in celebration of the knowledge and skills they gained throughout the threeday experience. As participants left the Youth Summit, contact information between Programs was shared, pictures of new friends were taken, and conversations about the future of the #UnifiedGeneration echoed throughout Nairobi.







# **OUTCOMES**



#### Special Olympics Africa Youth Leadership Summit

The 2019 Special Olympics Africa Regional Youth Leadership Summit offered the 12 attending Programs a platform for sharing best practices, addressing critical issues and creating strategies for enhancing Regional youth engagement. Throughout the course of the three-day summit, Youth Leaders developed and expanded their understanding of how to drive social inclusion in their respective countries, cities, schools, and communities. Participants learned about new strategies and methods to help bring to life their vision of a more inclusive world using the Special Olympics Unified Sports model and the Special Olympics Unified Schools model. Each delegation received a Youth Innovation Grant ranging from \$1,000 - \$2,000 USD to implement a project in their school or community based on the information they learned at the Youth Summit. These projects will be implemented in 12 countries around Africa, and will further promote inclusion in schools and communities.



#### **MOVING FORWARD**

Special Olympics Africa Regional Staff will oversee the planning and implementation of upcoming national and local-level Youth Summits across the Africa Region. Participants of the Regional Youth Leadership Summit will help to support the national and local-level Youth Summits and educate other Youth Leaders about the power of the **#UnifiedGeneration**.

# **PROJECT SPOTLIGHT**



#### Special Olympics Cote d'Ivoire



Jessica and Marie are Special Olympics Youth Leaders from Cote d'Ivoire who will lead a Youth Innovation Project aimed at researching the causes of absenteeism among Youth with intellectual disabilities. Based on their findings, Jessica and Marie will develop strategies for inclusion in their schools and communities and encourage Youth Leaders to take action in support of Unified Schools. In doing so, Jessica and Marie hope to create a community in which those with and without intellectual disabilities respect and appreciate one another, growing the Unified Generation.

Over the course of their project, Jessica and Marie will work to research the causes of Youth with intellectual disabilities not attending school. Jessica and Marie will present their findings to leaders of education in Cote d'Ivoire and execute the "Include Me as I Am" campaign in order to bring awareness and create change in their community. Through their efforts, Jessica and Marie plan to create 12 new Unified Sports Clubs, 10 new Unified Champion Schools, and gain over one thousand social media impressions. Jessica and Marie will harnessing the power of their social campaign to create tangible change so that those with intellectual disabilities in their community can attend school and be accepted as they are.

#### **PROJECT SPOTLIGHT**



#### Special Olympics Burkina Faso



**Gislain** and **Kouka** are Special Olympics Youth Leaders from Burkina Faso who participated in the 2018 Global Youth Leadership Forum in Azerbaijan. Gislain and Kouka were excited to continue learning about Youth Leadership at the Special Olympics Africa Youth Summit and ways they could lead a project to promote inclusion in their community. Their Youth Innovation Project is to organize a Unified Sports competition with different schools in their area. Through their project, Gislain and Kouka hope to give all youth with and without intellectual disabilities the opportunity to play together and to develop new Unified teams in each school.

Over the course of their three-month project, Gislain and Kouka will engage more than 100 youth with and without intellectual disabilities, create four new Unified Schools, and two new Unified Champion Schools. Gislain and Kouka see Unified Sports and Unified Schools as a way to fight discrimination against individuals with intellectual disabilities and make local schools a welcoming and support environment for everyone. By getting more Youth involved with Unified Sports and Unified Schools, Gislain and Kouka are growing the Unified Generation and spreading inclusion through their community and beyond.

# **PROJECT SPOTLIGHT**



#### Special Olympics Senegal



**Soda** and **Aminata** are Special Olympics Youth Leaders from Senegal who will lead a Youth Innovation Project to spread inclusion in their community by created Unified Schools at four local schools in their community. Soda and Aminata will help each school organize Unified Sports, Young Athletes programs, and artistic activities. Through their project, Soda and Aminata will educate school directors, teachers, and students about inclusion and awareness of those with intellectual disabilities.

In addition to establishing four new Unified Schools, Soda and Aminata will engage over 100 youth with and without intellectual disabilities throughout their six-month project. At the conclusion of the project, Soda and Aminata will hold a closing ceremony to celebrate each of the schools and their new Special Olympics Unified Schools program. Soda and Aminata are members of the Unified Generation because they want to change the way individuals with intellectual disabilities are treated in their community. Their project will inspire others to join the Unified Generation, fight discrimination, and spread inclusion.
