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FOCUS OF THE SPECIAL OLYMPICS EUROPE EURASIA REGION

Youth leading the development of Unified Sports®

Incorporating the Unified Sports coaching theme into the Youth Leadership Summit is a core part of the Special Olympics Europe Eurasia strategy. It aims to create an alliance between youth activation, youth leadership and Unified Sports development. The involvement of young people is important for growth as Unified Schools and Youth Unified Sports develop in the Region.

Most of the Youth Leaders at the Summit have a Unified Sports background. Combining leadership skills with sports skills makes sure that youth are prepared to serve as role models, experts, influencers and coaches.

Easy language

Inclusion is key to all Special Olympics activities. This applies across all levels of the organization, starting on the sports field and going far beyond.

A key aspect of inclusion is to engage everyone in a meaningful way. To support this principle, European “easy-to-read” standards (Inclusion Europe, 2016) were applied at the European Youth Leadership Summit. This includes session design, materials, presentation outlines, and this report.

DAY 1: 1 FEBRUARY



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OPENING CEREMONY

At the Opening Ceremony, participants learned how to take action through the Lead to Include Project, and how together, they can create an inclusive and tolerant world by building a Unified Generation.

Isak Langfors and **Olle Ekman**, Youth Leaders from Special Olympics Sweden, welcomed all participants to their home country, Sweden. They shared their experience from being part of the 2019 Special Olympics Global Youth Leadership Summit and how their friendship is shaping the future of inclusion in their community.

Marie Ohlsson, Senior Lecturer Mid Sweden University, welcomed all delegations and wished them well in having valuable discussions at the University campus.

David Evangelista, Regional President and Managing Director of Special Olympics Europe Eurasia, welcomed everyone on behalf of the Special Olympics Europe Eurasia Region. He set the stage for the upcoming days of the Summit by sharing personal words of inspiration.

Then, participants listened to **Anna Kraik**, a local Sami singer. She shared the power of traditional *joiking* with the audience. She described *joiking* as "taking over where the words can't describe."





YOUTH LEADERSHIP IN SPECIAL OLYMPICS

After the Opening Ceremony, participants heard an update on Special Olympics Youth Leadership and Unified Sports engagement at global and Regional levels. This was led by **Kaitlyn Hamrick**, Special Olympics International, and **Sabine Menke**, Special Olympics Europe Eurasia. Following the global and Regional updates, Youth Leaders from Lithuania and Finland shared their experience with inclusion in their community.

After learning about the impact of Special Olympics around the world, delegations prepared for team building activities and shared inclusive experiences in their countries, led by **Jenni Häkkinen**, Special Olympics Europe Eurasia.

In the afternoon, participants participated in a Youth Leadership training session, led by **Elsa Havas**, Special Olympics Europe Eurasia, and **Julius Kramer**, World Scout Committee. This session covered how to identify leadership skills in one's self and others, and how to be an inclusive leader of today.

To finish the day, participants gathered at the Opening Ceremony of the Special Olympics Sweden Invitational Games to celebrate more than 300 athletes from 20 countries competing in seven winter sports.



DAY 2: 2 FEBRUARY



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POWER OF UNIFIED SPORTS THEORY SESSION

This session was split into two parts.

Tamara Medarts and **Valerie Geluykens**, Unified basketball experts from Belgium, explained the three models of Unified Sports and the core component of the Principle of Meaningful Involvement:

The Principle of Meaningful Involvement

- The most important principle in Unified Sports
- It means that every player on your team has a valuable role
- Emphasizes personal talent and skills

Tamara shared her journey from being a Special Olympics athlete to a Unified basketball player to an officially licensed basketball coach. Through her experience, Tamara:

learned to **interact with others**,
which is not always easy

learned to **be patient** and
understand that everyone is
different

accepted **her limitations**

learned to **ask for help**

gained more **self-esteem**





POWER OF UNIFIED SPORTS® PRACTICAL SESSION

During this session, Youth Leaders had hands-on training to learn what it is to be a great coach and to understand how to ensure the meaningful involvement of all players.

Focused on team-building in a Unified basketball setting. Made sure everyone's abilities were considered so that all players were involved in a meaningful way.







DAY 3: 3 FEBRUARY



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YOUTH LEADERSHIP IMPACT AT THE LOCAL LEVEL

Summit delegates met students from two local Unified Schools, **Jämtlands Gymnasium Wargentin** and **Storsjögymnasiet**. They saw the positive impact of working together in the local community through Unified Sports activities. The local students also joined in celebrating a successful Summit at the cultural night that concluded the event.



Special Olympics **Youth Innovation Projects** provide young people with and without intellectual disabilities the financial support they need to implement projects for inclusion in their community.

Participants learned about this grant program, developed a project plan and prepared to apply for the funding.



Two **Swedish Youth Leaders** presented a project they led to create an inclusive environment in their community. They organized a football day that connected local community partners with three special education schools. Their project was supported by Special Olympics Youth Innovation Grants.

In Finland, there are not enough activities in rural areas, specifically in northern and eastern Finland.

PROJECT ACTIVITIES

The project will bring Unified Sports activities to mainstream sport clubs and provide new opportunities for inclusion across Finland.

PROJECT GOAL

To expand Unified Sports opportunities to smaller cities in Finland and host Finland's first National Youth Leadership Summit.

THE IMPACT

There will be a greater number of Unified Sports activities offered across the country and inclusion in local community sport clubs.








